Alamance County communities thrive when ...



- Rent is unaffordable for 46% of renters
- 10% of people don't have health insurance
- There is one mental health provider for every 590 residents



- There are 3 candidates for every job opening*
- The number of people working increased by 3% from Feb. 2020 (pre-COVID) to Dec. 2023
- The number of people working increased by 22% from Dec. 2007 (pre-Great Recession) to Dec. 2023



- 34% of residents are considered low-income (less than \$59,900 for a family of four)**
- The richest 5% of households make an average of 21 times more than the poorest 20% of households

^{**} A family of four is considered low-income if they make below 200% of the poverty level, or \$59,900 in 2022, the most recent year with available income data.
